Ann has been a member of the Saskatchewan Environmental Society's board of directors for the past 30 years and continues to volunteer on research and organizational tasks. She has a bachelor's degree in chemistry from the University of Durham, U.K., a Master of Arts from Smith College, Mass., USA and a Master of Science in nuclear chemistry from the University of California, Berkeley. Her research experience was gained at the Lawrence Berkeley Radiation Lab in California and the Windscale Sellafield Lab in Cumbria, UK. After moving to Canada with her

husband, raising a family, and taking training in adult education, she has worked in the Saskatchewan Community College system and done extensive volunteer work in environmental and international peace and development areas. During the 1990s she was a member of the board of directors of the Saskatchewan Energy Conservation and Development Authority and was part of SaskPower's Electrical Energy Options Review Panel. She was a founding member of the Canadian Climate Action Network and has served as a board member of the Canadian Environmental Network and of the Meewasin Valley Authority. As a representative of the Saskatchewan Environmental Society she has participated in many environmental assessment review processes, stakeholder task groups, interventions, and consultations.
